Below is a basic kit list with suggestions of what and where to buy. Please note this is only a guide. As with most art equipment go for the best you can afford, but cheaper brands are fine for practising and experimenting. I will have some A3 sheets of cartridge paper.

Suppliers:

Cass Art (online) <u>https://www.cassart.co.uk</u> - good quality, known brands, can have good deals.

The Range (online and stores) <u>https://www.therange.co.uk</u> - has a fair amount of art equipment at good prices, tend to aim for the known brands though, larger stores are better.

Jacksons Art (online) https://www.jacksonsart.com - good quality for the price, good range.

W.H. Smith - larger stores do a good range of single pencils and graphite sticks.

Artesaver sell Seawhites brand, which are a good quality student range of materials at a reasonable price <u>https://www.artesaver.co.uk</u>

 Sketch pad A3 - I prefer a heavier weight to my sketch pads, simply because I can use it for other things as well as drawing! Such as this one below from Cass Art - 200 gsm. You can go for lighter weight if you wish(120gsm would be lighter weight). I have recommended A3 size as I will be using that, but A4 will also work, which is smaller.

Or Smooth finish watercolour paper can also work.

Brushes - You will need a round fitch brush, or a traditional Chinese or Japanese painting brush. Again the quality and price varies greatly, but again I would advise against going too cheap, as cheaper brushes tend to loose their shape and bristles! Which can be frustrating. There are so many different types of brushes I have just gone for a basic round brush - around a number 8 or 10 is a good size.

Sets tend to be cheaper, so if you plan on watercolour or ink painting the sets below are a good range. Or you can buy them singly, you will only need one round brush for this project.

Brush sizes which I think are a good range to start :- Round brushes 0, 2, 4, 6, 8. Flat fitch(square shape) - 3/8, 5/8.

I like Pro Arte, which are good at a reasonable price, Cass Art do a small pack which is good to begin with, and has all of the sizes above except 5/8, see link below:-
